### **HEAD START PHILOSOPHY**

- 1. Head Start is based on the premise that all children share certain needs and can benefit from a comprehensive developmental program designed to meet those needs.
- 2. Head Start's program approach is based on the philosophy that the child's entire family, as well as the community, must be involved. The family is seen as the principal influence on the child's development and therefore should be a direct participant in the program.
- 3. The overall goal of Head Start is to bring about a greater degree of social competence.
- **4.** Head Start provides opportunities for the improvement of the child's health and physical abilities and opportunities to enhance every child's access to an adequate diet.
- **5.** Head Start provides activities which encourage self-confidence, autonomy, and curiosity— all of which assist in healthy social and emotional development.
- **6.** Head Start provides professional personnel whose focus is the enhancement of the child's cognitive development, with particular attention to developing strong reasoning and problem-solving skills.
- 7. Head Start seeks to create opportunities for consistency and routine for each child. Stable, consistent learning environments will engender confidence in each child, enhancing learning efforts and overall healthy development.
- **8.** Head Start attempts to foster and maintain healthy relationships between the child and the family through a myriad of support services.
- **9.** Head Start provides an environment that nurtures and supports the growth of healthy self-esteem and the development of a positive self-concept.

## **HEAD START MISSION FOR STAFF DEVELOPMENT**

St. Vincent de Paul of Baltimore Head Start is committed to encouraging and supporting efforts of employees to improve skills, abilities, and knowledge in a manner that will help them to be more productive in their current assignments and to prepare for career advancement as opportunities arise. Provision for education, professional development events, in-service training, conferences, professional and technical groups, staff meetings and conferences, and grantee-sponsored training events or classes are offered to employees and is a high priority in our Head Start Program.

## **MEET MELISSA**

hen Melissa first came to Head Start, it was at the peak of the pandemic. She was trying to navigate the process of homeschooling her children when a friend recommended St. Vincent de Paul. Although everything was still virtual at the time, she was eager to enroll her son, Damian into a structured early education program. "I didn't have to worry about anything," she said. "They already have the curriculum." But as soon as

her son was enrolled, she discovered that a relationship with SVDP Head Start offered more than just a quality academic plan.

"They have workshops that help you—as a parent—work alongside your child in these development years," she explains. A conscientious mother, Melissa eagerly threw herself into home learning programs, participated in Circle of Security, and attended Mommy and Me workshops. When Damian was diagnosed with a speech delay, she received help navigating the process of getting support and setting up an IEP. She also appreciated the meal pickups on virtual days and the extra support she received during the holidays.



"We didn't have to worry," she said.
"The school was there to help us."

"Because barriers to child development don't just occur inside a classroom, SVDP takes a holistic approach to improve economic and health outcomes for our Head Start families," explains Terah Turrentine, Senior Family Services Supervisor at St. Vincent de Paul. "By addressing these needs when children are still very young, we are laying a foundation of stability that

families can continue to build upon for years to come."

"My son is 5 years old and loves to read!" Melissa is proud to share. "I love that they work with the Science Center. They have robotics. And I love their summer camp too. I think it helped a lot!"

Three years after she first enrolled Damian, Melissa's daughter Isabella is now also a part of the same Head Start program at Patterson Park. She credits the strong relationship she has with St. Vincent de Paul with helping her build a solid foundation for Isabella's early childhood development.

## **SCHOOL READINESS GOALS**

#### SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

SVDP students will be socially responsible, self-directed and confident individuals with a strong sense of community and an overall willingness, desire and ability to work collaboratively with others.

#### LANGUAGE AND LITERACY DEVELOPMENT

SVDP students will be articulate and literate, able to decode written and spoken communications and able to express themselves verbally in a variety of situations for a multitude of purposes.

#### COGNITIVE AND GENERAL KNOWLEDGE

SVDP students will demonstrate observation and inference skills, and effectively use mathematical concepts and skills daily.

#### PHYSICAL HEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT

SVDP students will leave the program healthier and more physically fit than when they enrolled and understand the differences between decisions that support or sabotage good health.

#### APPROACHES TO LEARNING

SVDP students will emerge as leaders in the city; as self-assured and confident young citizens who are both eager to learn and willing to teach. They will engage, with steady perseverance, in social and community projects and tasks.


